Northwest Professional Educators now offers \$250 New Classroom Start-Up Grants as well as our \$200-\$500 Teacher Scholarships for continuing education and Classroom Mini-Grants for classroom needs. All educators are eligible, but as always, NWPE members receive first preference!

To qualify for the \$250 New Classroom Start-Up Grant, one must be teaching in a new school this year. The grant is designed to assist teachers new to their school or the profession with the frustrating and expensive task of setting up a new classroom.



Congratulations to the following Northwest Professional Educators members who were awarded Teacher Scholarships/Classroom Mini-Grants from our fall 2005 review of applications:



**David Meyer**, a middle school special education teacher at Telford Academy in the Bonneville Joint School District, Idaho Falls, Idaho, was awarded \$500 to assist him in pursuit of his Masters of Education in Administration.

David believes that the experience he is gaining at Telford, an alternative public middle school, will be invaluable when he becomes an administrator. If administrators and teachers knew how to help the severely problematic child, he is convinced there were be less need for alternative schools.

David learned about NWPE through the scholarship program. "I couldn't have been more thrilled to learn about the organization's mission and goals! To find a professional organization that focuses solely on putting children first, without the political and social agendas, is refreshing."

Annie believes that the professionalism of educators will be improved if they focus on a mission to increase students' skills and not be overly distracted by process and procedure. This mission should be clearly communicated to parents, communities and the nation.

He is excited to use the tools learned to send a class full of confident readers to fourth grade next year.


#### MEMBER SPREADS THE WORD IN OREGON NEWSPAPER
